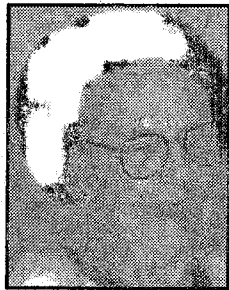

Glatfelter oversaw growth of mill

Philip H. Glatfelter III, who led the family paper mill in Spring Grove through a period of extraordinary growth, died Wednesday at his home. He was 80.

"A lot of the accomplishments we had in the 1980s go back to the foundation work we did under his leadership in the 1960s," said Tom Norris, president and chief executive of P.H. Glatfelter Co. "He took a lot of pride in the company. We accomplished a great deal under his leadership."

Born March 17, 1916, Glatfelter was the son of Philip H. and Cassandra (McClellan) Glatfelter. He went to work at the paper mill bearing his family's name at age 22, upon graduating from Brown University. He started in the

plant's wastewater treatment plant.

During World War II, he served on the War Production Board in York and later enlisted in the U.S. Navy. He served in both the Atlantic and Pacific theaters of war, as a lieutenant on the U.S.S. Arkansas.

After the war, he returned to Spring Grove, where he rejoined the family business. In 1948, he was named a director of the company and executive vice president.

In 1954, he was elected president of the company, the fourth generation of Glatfelters to hold that post.

During his tenure as president, the company became a pioneer in the papermaking industry, developing manufacturing and environmental technologies that became industry standards.

He oversaw expansion of the company's wastewater treatment plant and the construction of Lake PaHaGoCo. Later, in the 1960s, he oversaw additional environmental projects and the construction of Lake Marburg.

"He took great pride in the efforts we made on the environmental front," Norris said. "He was a lifelong conservationist. He set the tone for many of our practices today."

Glatfelter was also active in the community, serving with the York County Chamber of Commerce, the Manufacturer's Association of York County, the York Conservation Council, the York

County Water Resource Commission, York Hospital, Gettysburg College and Penn State — York.

He'd also served as forest commissioner with the state Forestry Department and as a director of the National Reserve Bank in Philadelphia and of the Pennsylvania Wildlife Federation.

He loved sports and was a backer of York Sports Night. He regularly attended basketball games in the company's in-house league.

He was an outdoorsman and was well known as an accomplished fly fisherman, Norris said.

"I'd characterize him as a very personable individual," said Norris, who had known Glatfelter for 40 years. "He liked dealing with people and he liked our employees. He knew his employees and they knew him."

Following duty to his country, George began his career at the P.H. George was instrumental in directing major expansions of the Spring Grove mill and the Company experienced tremendous growth under his leadership. Investments in large-scale papermaking, the addition of off-line paper coating capability, and leading-edge improvements in environmental technology were all completed under his guidance. These improvements combined to make the mill one of the most versatile operating platforms in the paper industry, and formed the foundation for the Glatfelter Company of today.

His colleagues will remember George as a 'hands-on' manager who listened more than he talked, and who formed strong and respectful relationships with employees at all levels of the company.

Mr. Glatfelter served the local area as a member of the Board of Directors for York Country Day School, York Junior Achievement, York YMCA, Western Michigan University Paper Institute, P.H. Glatfelter Co., and the Glatfelter Pulp Wood Company.

He was a member of the Mill Quarter Century Club and was a member of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Spring Grove. 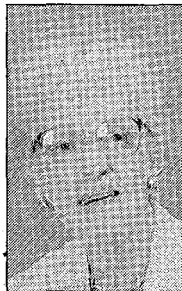

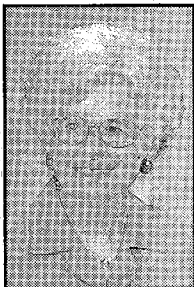

Mrs. Reber was born August 31, 1914, at home, the daughter of Veartie Glatfelter Markey and Michael Markey. Markey ancestors emigrated from Switzerland in 1736, at a time that many Anabaptists fled reli-

Before her marriage to Norman Reber of Berks County in 1938, Mrs. Reber worked at Bernstein's sewing factory in West York as a Dress folder and packer, a job she would take up again as a working mother in the 1950s. She was a member of the International Ladies Garment Worker's Union.

Her husband's work took her to Freehold, N.J., then Orlando, outside Philadelphia. As a homemaker, she made brilliant corn fritters, turkey croquettes, schnitz and knepp, roast beef, dandelion, strawberry jam, pies, cherry pudding, pot pie and hog maw, many from recipes of her oldest sister, the late Mazie Markey Lehman of Loganville, who ran the Markey household while their mother attended market and cared for the younger children.

When Mrs. Reber's husband was hired as a writer by the Pennsylvania Farmer in Harrisburg in 1946, postwar housing shortages kept them from living in the state capital and they bought a home not far from where she grew up in York. The house looked across a ridge to where her first cousin, Iva Kehr lived. The two of them, close friends since childhood, would later collaborate publishing a genealogical history of the Markey Family. The played Scrabble on winter evenings.

In addition to the factory and department store jobs, Mrs. Reber worked variously picking strawberries for her brother-in-law, Emore Lehman and in the greenhouses of Betty Miller on Indian Rock Dam Road, now a thriving plant business.

gious intolerance in Europe. Their exact reason for emigration is not known, but by the 20th Century, many Markeys were part of one of the Anabaptist emigrant churches, the Church of the Brethren.

Twelve of Elsie's siblings grew to adulthood to become farmers, market women and nurses. Three of them survive, Esther Newcomer of Seven Valleys, Ruth Eckert of New Oxford and Evelyn Chronister of York.

Growing up on the farm, Mrs. Reber's favorite tasks were harvesting strawberries and climbing trees to pick cherries. Despite advancing osteoporosis, she insisted on picking berries up to age 87.

Mrs. Reber was a member of New Fairview Church of the Brethren, near Spry, where her father was a minister and later an elder. She taught Sunday School and was active in the women's group. Her husband, the late Norman F. Reber, was a lay minister in the church for nearly half a century.

In the 1920s, Mrs. Reber attended Jessop's one-room school on Grantley Road, repeating the eighth grade twice because she liked it and her teacher, the Harry Hovis, so much. She loved poetry and continued to recite it in her adult years and read to her children Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's "Hiawatha", Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island" and other classics.

She was unable to attend high school because she was needed on the farm, where she worked several more years, as was expected of children in those days. She then sought work in the city.

In 1976, Elsie and Norman volunteered for a few years at the Church of the Brethren's Central offices in Elgin, Ill., where Elsie worked in the book and gift store. During the 1950s, she was a counselor at the church's Camp Swatara in Bethel, Pa. She loved to travel and took the family across country to California and in the mid 1950s on to New England and Virginia. Her children's lives took her through the South, the North and South Carolina, to Ohio, Texas and German. She was 79 when one of them moved to Kenya, and she shook her head upon receiving the news. "I'm sorry to say, we won't be able to make that trip".

Norman died in 1998.

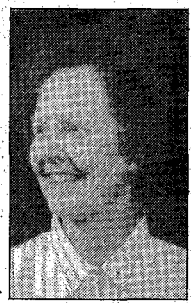

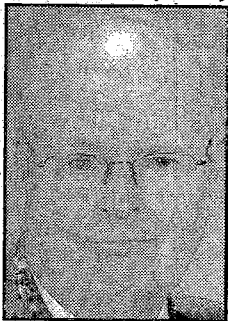
