Mid-Winter Board meeting

The meeting was held at the Smith Homestead, now known as the House of Hope, in Jacobus, Pa. Directors in attendance were Tom Shelley, Judy Martin, Philip Glatfelter, Rick Gladfelter, Bonnie Flaharty, Dean Gladfelter, Stephen Gladfelter, Larry Gladfelter Jr. and John Shelley. Board Members who attended via conference call were Pamela Tuscany, Bonnie Baim, Sarah Melcher, Rick Hoover, Chris Glatfelter and Dallas Smith.

After President Tom Shelley opened the meeting with a prayer, Larry Gladfelter Jr. shared correspondence from the website:

On August 13, Tod Hildebrand asked if the Casper Glattfelder Association maintains an accurate "family tree" for the Glattfelders going back as far as their origins to Eschenmosen and Glattfelden in Bulach, Zurich, Switzerland. He is a descendant of Barbara Glattfelder, who was married to Casper's brother, John Peter. In 1748, Barbara married Johannes Hildebrand (b.1715), who is Tod's seventh great grandfather. Tod was born in York in 1956.

On September 1, a message was received from Jo Brand, who noted she is related to Casper through his son Henry. Her mother received a number of photos from the late 1800s and early 1900s that she believes are mostly from Henry Klinedinst Gladfelter's generation (cousins and siblings?).

Director and editor Philip Glatfelter responded to Jo and we eventually obtained copies of the photos and included one in the Fall Newsletter.

On November 30, an email from danasilcox@gmail.com says her g-g-g-grandmother was Mary Ann Clodgelter, born Feb 14, 1825, in Catawba, North Carolina, and died November 17, 1904. "I have been unable to

satisfactorily trace her lineage back to the link to Switzerland ancestor. We live in France and intend to go to Glattfelden. I would very much like to fill in the blanks so our visit is an informed one. Thank you!!"

Larry forwarded the email to our French relative, Jean-Pierre Glattfelder, who responded with some information, as did Jutta Creager, who is related to the Glattfelders through her husband Harold and has been of great assistance to the Association.

On December 16, an email from Ronnie Eugene Buchanan Baldwin noted that Casper's brother Johann (John) Peter is his eighth great grandfather. Larry said we receive messages like this from time to time that do not include any questions.

On January 8, a message from Barbara Young Riley said she believes she is a descendant of Casper's son Casper through his second daughter Dorothy (1784-1868). Barbara wanted to prove that Dorothy is part of the ancestry data base of the Daughters of the American Revolution and wondered if the Association has a data base of genealogical records. She was also looking to find a copy of the will for one of her descendants, John Everhart, who married Dorothy Glatfelder. Barbara is related through their daughter, Eve Pittman.

Barbara also inquired about records for Casper and wife Eve (Maria Eva) in the Shuster's Reformed register. "I am looking forward to hopefully becoming part of the Glatfelder family," Barbara said in the email.

Larry forwarded the email to Jutta and Tom, who supplied additional information.

Treasurer Bonnie Flaharty reported that the

Association had a loss of about \$4,000. The Financial Report was passed unanimously.

Rick Gladfelter, for the Investment Committee, reported that most of the committee's work was concluded and investments were moved from Morgan-Stanley to Fidelity and continue to do very well.

The Executive Committee met prior to the board meeting to prepare the 2022 budget, using last year's financial report as a base. More emphasis will be made on fundraising in upcoming Newsletters.

For the Brick Patio Committee, Phil reported a second order of nine bricks was placed in the fall. Phil also bought Sharpies to use to color in letters that are fading on some bricks. Other methods are also being investigated, rather than replacing those bricks.

Larry reported for the Communications Committee. At the last board meeting, a motion was made to create a survey to determine people's desire to use credit cards to pay for CGAA transactions, along with questions regarding videos/DVDs. The survey was published November 6 and advertised on the Facebook group page, "I Am A Descendent of the Glatfelters."

There were only 10 responses, almost all from the Facebook post. It was noted that accepting credit cards through Director Sarah Melcher is a good option, and Phil and Sarah will work on details to propose to the board.

Larry also noted that for many years, the "dynamic duo" of Dallas and Phil produced the Newsletters, and November's was the first solo effort by Phil. The Association owes a debt of gratitude to both Dallas and Phil for their work over the years, and to Phil for his continuing good work. Phil said he plans to continue producing the Newsletters on his own, but said he would always welcome suggestions for Newsletter content.

The November Newsletter was published and email notifications were sent out November 29 to 511 subscribers, with 505 successfully delivered. There was an open rate of 57.9%. Larry also announced the availability of the Newsletter on the Facebook page, "I Am a Descendent of the Glatfelters." There were 230 printed copies mailed.

Phil reported that Harry Gladfelter continues to find additional patent holders as he works on Part

2 of the program, "The Glattfelders and Their Patents." Numerous participants have expressed interest in being part of the program.

Phil and Harry met in February, and in along with more wonderful additions to the patents program, Harry is uncovering many fascinating Glattfelders in other fields, such as art and music.

For the Property Committee, Tom shared that the well was not winterized and there may be a need to replace the pressure tank. A plumber will be called in the spring.

In continuing business, Phil is working on formatting H.I. Gladfelter's journal and hopes to have it ready to publish in the near future, with York County historians Scott Mingus and Jim McClure offering to assist.

Phil raised a question: Could the Glattfelder Homestead house be added to the National Register of Historic Places? He gathered some information about the process, which indicated that the house would indeed qualify. The Kinsleys, who own the house, were consulted and decided that it was not in their best interest.

Director Chris Glatfelter spoke with an attorney about the Association's 501(c)(7) designation. He shared discouraging news, noting that it is difficult to establish 501(c)(3) status. There was additional discussion pertaining to broadening membership as well as including ancestors of John Peter, though that would not help in the process.

Tom asked the board to check on any contacts for an attorney who could do some pro bono work in our pursuit of 501(c)(3) status. Chris said she is willing to edit and update our charter and bylaws as needed.

2022 Reunion

This year's Reunion is scheduled for Saturday, July 30 at Heimwald Park. We fully expect to have another successful gathering, though the lingering coronavirus pandemic could still force changes.

Harry Gladfelter has continued his wonderful work, collecting a mountain of information about Glattfelder descendants for Part 2 of the program, "Glattfelders and Their Patents." He will again take the main role in the program, which will include a PowerPoint presentation and several Glattfelder descendants he has uncovered taking part in the program or in attendance.

President's Message

The January meeting of the Directors occurred on what, at that time, had been the coldest day of the winter; with a low of 11.7 degrees and a high (if 27 degrees can truly be called a "high") that was well below freezing.

It was a day which many of our forebears would have considered "good butch'rin' weather." Old-time country butcherings were all day affairs, ideally conducted on some of the coldest days of the winter in order to reduce or eliminate the possibility of the freshly slaughtered meat spoiling.

In my teens, I frequently helped a Glattfelder descendant family with their annual day-after-Christmas butcherings; often in bitterly cold conditions eased only somewhat by the open fire of the spring house above which hung massive iron kettles.

Maybe it was a form of hazing, but early on, one of my jobs was to circulate back and forth from the relative warmth of the spring house to the deep chill outside to assist with the cleaning of the hog guts to prepare them for sausage making. Boiling-hot water from the kettle was poured over the washboard and the hands of the one who was doing the cleaning. Much later in the day, a variety of less-than-desirable pork parts were fed first into the grinder and then into the stuffer to fill those casings.

Mark Twain once observed that watching legislation being passed was like watching sausage being made, "not for the faint-hearted," and he was absolutely right.

Well, the same could and should be said of the process of creating this Association's annual budget; or more accurately, its spending plan. A budget should be balanced; but in recent years, ours has shown revenue figures which are well in excess of actual receipts.

As mentioned in this column one year ago, one of the major expenses is our annual Reunion. While Reunion meal reservation income has matched projections, that revenue barely covers half of the total Reunion expenses. Rental of portable restrooms, tables and chairs, and stipends for the sound system and the Brodbecks Band account for the other half ... all of which are funded through other donations.

But the largest expenditure in the annual spending plan budget is for the upkeep of the park itself. Property taxes — always increasing — and insurance cost about \$8 per day. The total cost of maintaining the park is close to \$100 per week or \$5,200 per year.

A lesser expense — but no less an essential service — is the cost of maintaining our historical records and communicating to our family through the newsletter, now provided in both a printed and a digital format. The website has enjoyed a truly global readership and, of course, is the platform for offering the digitized (and color-enhanced) version of the newsletter. Providing a comprehensive website along with printed communications cost about \$10 per day.

Our spending plan is far more lean than the sausages I helped to stuff in bygone years. It is not as bare as the bones that were discarded, but there is hardly enough "fat" to press out even one "cracklin".

We depend almost entirely on YOUR generosity, supplemented only slightly by the generosity of those who have contributed to the Endowment Fund. No gift is too small. No contribution is too insignificant.

Even the teen who carries water from the kettle at a country butchering plays a vital part!

Wall of Honor

I'll admit I'm not exactly sure why this item was in that folder or why, in my recollection, not made more conspicuous.


The item in question (shown here) is a certificate from the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation, Inc., signifying that Casper Glattfelder is included on The American Immigrant Wall of Honor.

The certificate is accompanied by a letter, addressed to Mrs. Dorothy McCormack of Wenonah, New Jersey, and is dated May 6, 1988. The letter, as well as the certificate, are signed by Lee Iacocca. In part, it reads:

"I am proud to present you with the official Certificate of the American Immigrant Wall of Honor.

"The name of you or your family member has been recorded on your Certificate for all to see.

"And it will soon appear on public display



at Ellis Island as testament to the heroism and triumphs your family experienced in coming to America for the first time.

"The many thousands of visitors who will come to Ellis Island each year will recognize and respect your family's role in fulfilling the American dream of hope, freedom and opportunity for all."

As we continue to find out, Glattfelder descendants appear in many places and have been part of the country's history in many ways. While we know that Casper and his party arrived in America in Philadelphia in 1743, it's comforting to know that his name is recognized at yet another important place in America.

A guide for Glattfelden

(Editor's note: Koni Ulrich has been a contact for Glattfelder descendants visiting Glattfelden for many years. Here, he offers some advice for those visiting in the future.)

At the old and protected part of Glattfelden in the canton of Zurich, only a few meters from here, we usually welcome our guests in the Cultural Centre of the town. The Protestant church is very close and a walk to the Glatt takes only five minutes. Don't miss it!

Going back to 1985 -- and even further -- smaller and bigger groups of U.S. Glattfelders have been visiting Switzerland about every year. Most of them have been guided by Koni Ulrich,



73, and our friend Henry Glattfelder, 79, son of Dr. Hans Glattfelder, who once initialized and

renewed the relation between the United States and Switzerland, concerning their relatives by the same name.

Most of our guided tours of Glattfelden over the years have included our mayor. In the last eight years, this has been Ernst Gassmann. Some of you might remember Pier-Luigi Quattropani, who came to the 100th reunion in 2005, together with Koni and Henry and Myrtha Glattfelder, and did some yodeling.

Usually, people want to spend one or half a day in Glattfelden. You can reach the town from Zurich by public transportation (train S9 and bus from Glattfelden Station to town). A walk from the Glattfelder train station to the town along the Glatt takes less than an hour.

Here are some things to do while in Glattfelden:

- -- Tour of the Cultural Centre of town, with the main house being almost 500 years old.
- -- Walk around town, including the wooden bridge over the Glatt, cemetery and church, in collaboration with the pastors. The church is where Casper was baptized and married.
- -- Lunch at the community-owned restaurant, Il Duetto, formerly Guesthouse Lion.
- -- Visit the resort Riverside at the Glatt, with restaurants, exhibitions, bowling and hotel rooms. (a 40-minute walk).

News and notes

• A couple of weeks before Memorial Day 2021, President Shelley helped members of the Pleasureville American Legion Post place flags at the graves of Veterans interred at the Mount Rose Cemetery in York. While going about that solemn work, he met representatives of Wreaths Across America (WAM), an organization which seeks to place live green wreaths at Veterans' graves during the week prior to Christmas.

Tom inquired whether they had ever considered placing wreaths at the Bupp's Union Cemetery, where our Association has erected replication monuments to Casper and his Revolutionary War participant son, Felix. The WAM representative said they had not, at least to the best of her knowledge.

Information about Veterans at Bupp's Union was then sent; with the result that this past December, for the first time, the "boys of Bupp's Union" (to borrow the phrase used by a deceased



former caretaker of the graveyard) received wreaths on Christmas Eve.

• In the November Newsletter, I wrote about the Lincoln Highway and its possible influence on the Glattfelders.

Turns out, the reverse is also true.

In January, on the "I Am a Descendant of the Glatfelters" website, Sally Strunkel inquired about a Dr. H.E. Glatfelter. Sally noted that Dr. Glatfelter "was instrumental in getting the Lincoln Highway to go through (Nebraska) along the Platte River-which is now US Highway 30. He was also involved in getting pump irrigation to be allowed for farmers when it was so needed because of droughts."

After some research, I uncovered some information on H.E. (Harvey) in a story in the August 7, 1950, edition of the Grand Island (Nebraska) Daily Independent. It noted that H.E., a Central City physician, was an early "agitator" for better roads, as early as 1897. Part of his "agitation" stemmed from an accident he suffered while on a bicycle built for two – on a dirt road not really suited for that activity.

H.E. helped form the Platte Valley Transcontinental Good Roads Association, which the newspaper said was "the forerunner of all highway associations," in 1906. At the time, there was no federal agency for road construction and, consequently, there were no federal funds.

Later in the article, it states that "In view of the pioneer work he had done in the interest of better road conditions, Dr. Glatfelter was 'delegated' on May 8, 1913, to organize The Lincoln Highway Association. ... Dr. Glatfelter recalls the

ceremonies formally opening the Lincoln Highway as a transcontinental route about 1913."

Among H.E.'s other endeavors was a run for lieutenant governor in Nebraska in 1942, receiving nearly 2,900 votes.

H.E. was born in Springfield Township, York County, Pa., in 1869, and was a descendant of Casper through his son Felix.

• History was made April 10 with Association President Tom Shelley's Ordination to the Holy Diaconate at the Greek Orthodox Church of the Annunciation of York.

"I doubt that there have ever been any family members to enter the ranks of the Orthodox clergy;" President Shelley said. "Moreover, this was the first Ordination to occur at Annunciation of 'one of their own' in their 104-year history."
